She enjoyed equally watching plays and sports, especially if they were Broadway quality or included Peyton Manning. Her perfect Sunday mornings involved reading the Washington Post with a cup of coffee, while eating banana/egg pancakes made by her life partner, Mike, that were sweetened by syrup and the laughter of Kahnu and Tolashi, her beloved stepdaughters. Despite being a minimalist with no patience for clutter, Sharon was deeply sentimental. She held close the things she treasured the most - a copy of A Prayer for Owen Meany with annotations from friends; gifts of jewelry from those she loved; and pictures reminding her of her most precious relationships with her dogs, family, and friends.

Sharon was a loving daughter, wise sister to many, loyal friend, devoted partner, and caring stepparent. She will be missed by so many.
