

Beginning Student Survey: Fall 2000 Prepared by the Campus Assessment Working Group Studies of Entry Subgroup July 24, 2001

This report summarizes the results of the 2000 Beginning Student Survey (BSS). The survey was administered in late October and early November, 2000. The BSS was developed by the Studies of Entry Subgroup of the Campus Assessment Working Group (CAWG), with input from various campus clients.

The administration was achieved through the assistance of various instructors who provided class time Fall 2000, and other administrators who helped distribute surveys via other methods during that time. Surveys were administered in the following courses: ENGL101, EDCP108O/UNIV101, BSOS188A/188C, EDCP108N, HONR100/HONR100G, and ANSC101. Surveys were also distributed through the Academic Achievement Programs/IED.

Students responded directly on printed forms designed for optical scanning. An instruction sheet was provided for instructors and administrators to read, or to be included in a letter that accompanied the survey. Previous years' administrations indicated 20 minutes were required for the survey to be completed. Copies of the survey and the instruction sheet follow the data tables.

Surveys were visually inspected prior to scanning; stray marks were erased and responses were darkened as needed. Reviews for potential sources of error associated with patterns of missing values revealed no significant concerns.

The survey provided a space for students to write their Student Identification Number. When voluntarily provided, it was used to link with official university records to include demographic information in the analysis.

The survey was potentially distributed to 3,350 students (as determined by course rosters and Academic Achievement Program/IED decision code). In contrast to previous years, students were instructed to take the survey even if they had already completed it in another class. (Multiple surveys for students will be used to study the reliability of the instrument.) A total of 2,898 surveys were returned. Of these, 2184 were first surveys from first-time, full-time freshmen.

Survey items are included in their entirety in this report. Each survey table represents the valid responses of first-time (non-transfer) full-time freshmen excluding missing and "does not apply" responses. The N noted on each item reflects the number of valid responses for that item.
