

# Beginning Student Survey: Fall 1999 Prepared by the Campus Assessment Working Group Studies of Entry Subgroup

This report summarizes the results of the 1999 Beginning Student Survey (BSS). The survey was administered in late October and early November, 1999. The BSS was developed by the Studies of Entry Subgroup of the Campus Assessment Working Group (CAWG), with input from various campus clients.

The administration was achieved through the assistance of various instructors who provided class time Fall 1999, and other administrators who helped distribute surveys via other methods during that time. Surveys were administered in the following courses: ENGL101, EDCP108O/UNIV101, BSOS188A/188C, EDCP108N, HONR100/HONR100G, and ANSC101. Surveys were also distributed through the Academic Achievement Programs/IED.

Students responded directly on printed forms designed for optical scanning. An instruction sheet was provided for instructors and administrators to read, or to be included in a letter that accompanied the survey. Previous years' administrations indicated 20 minutes were required for the survey to be completed. Copies of the survey and the instruction sheet follow the data tables.

Surveys were visually inspected prior to scanning; stray marks were erased and responses were darkened as needed. Reviews for potential sources of error associated with patterns of missing values revealed no significant concerns.

The survey provided a space for students to write their Student Identification Number. When voluntarily provided, it was used to link with official university records to include demographic information in the analysis.

The survey was potentially distributed to 3640 students (as determined by course rosters and Academic Achievement Program/IED decision code). We have no way of knowing how many students were absent from classes, or how many received the survey but didn't return it. Of those, 2628 surveys were returned, representing a 72% response rate. Of those returned, 2253 (86%) included a voluntarily provided Student Identification Number and were thus matched with institutional data. Of those matched with institutional data, 2078 were first-time full-time freshmen, representing 57% of the original sample.

Survey items are included in their entirety in this report. Each survey table represents the valid responses of first-time (non-transfer) full-time freshmen excluding missing and "does not apply" responses. The N noted on each item reflects the number of valid responses for that item.
